Context	<p>The aim of this plan is to provide awareness of the sort of potential though unlikely emergencies the Parish could one day face where local resources and knowledge might be called upon to complement local authorities, emergency services and other secondary responders. Being prepared and able to respond to an emergency will help vulnerable residents better cope with and recover from an emergency. The term 'emergency' is used in relation to an event or situation that threatens serious damage to human welfare (inc. loss of life) or to the environment.</p>																						
Local Risk Assessment	<p>Although impossible to pre-empt exactly what emergencies might arise it is possible to identify generic threats to our community; some emergencies might be considered more likely than others and may be very local (i.e. effecting just one street or the most vulnerable residents) or more widespread impacting a whole village or beyond when local authorities and emergency services may be stretched. Some situations may be forewarned (i.e. exceptionally severe weather forecasts) when the Parish Emergency Committee might be able to take pre-emptive action to protect the most vulnerable. Local Skills & Resources	<p>Skills. Acknowledging that residents with specific skills may not be immediately available to support the Emergency Committee, at the time of writing it is believed that the Parish skill set includes: NHS trained First Responders, nurses, first aiders, crisis management and operations experience, carers, retired fire fighter, mechanics, electricians, plant drivers, tree surgeon, and general manpower.</p> <p>Resources. The Parish Council's database of know resources includes: Snow clearing equipment, tractors, 4x4 vehicles, quad bike, dumper truck, mobile temporary accommodation, chain saws, portable cookers & gas bottles, portable lighting & generators.</p> <p>Note: If the emergency area of concern is confined to the Parish then the Emergency Committee would consider approaching neighbouring Parishes for additional support.</p>
Places of Safety	<p>Bradfield Combust – Manger Public House or Stanningfield Village Hall. Stanningfield – Village Hall or Red House/Manger Public Houses.</p>
Emergency Contact List	The Emergency Committee will comprise the 8 Parish Councillors (who hold contact details for all) and co-opting residents with key skills as required.

Activation Triggers	This plan will be activated by either the emergency services or local authorities contacting the Parish Council or indeed, by the Parish Council ahead of the Emergency Services or authorities being involved, or in response to forecasts and pre-warnings.
First Steps	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Emergency services and local authorities alerted as required. 2. Parish Council meets and forms Emergency Committee. 3. Confirm appropriate authorities have been informed (inc. any utility boards) 4. Consult with Emergency Planning Officers (see above). 5. Agree course of action and implement.
Emergency Committee Agenda	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Brief Emergency Committee on the situation (threat to life?). 2. Consider any action to contain/mitigate against the threat. 3. Identify who are the most vulnerable and needing what support. 4. Identify resources required – food, water, vehicles, shelter, manpower..? 5. Nominate Committee members to liaise directly with services and authorities. 6. Ensure any support is done safely at no extra risk.
Evacuation	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Liaise with emergency services and evacuate door to door. 2. Notify emergency services of evacuees needing assistance.
Communication Arrangements	<p>In order of preference:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Landline and mobile telephone if not disrupted. 2. By e-mail if deemed reactive enough & appropriate. 3. Use of runners as required. 4. Radio handsets as a last resort and if appropriate
